

BIKE SECURITY

Regrettably we have had 3 cycles stolen from the Academy site in the last few weeks. We are liaising with the Police and have passed some images and names to them of local youths we believe might be involved. We do everything we can to make security on site as robust as possible, but sometimes this is not enough to deter or prevent determined and organised thieves i.e. bolt croppers were used on one occasion to remove the padlock securing the gate to the bike sheds.



So what more can be done to prevent thefts and avoid personal financial loss as the Academy can not accept responsibility for personal items brought onto site that are subsequently lost, damaged or stolen? On 2 occasions the bikes that were stolen were not locked in the bike sheds. Whilst we do lock the gates during the day it is essential that a good quality and robust bike lock, designed to resist cutting/sawing, is also used by pupils to secure their bike to the racking. On the other occasion a bolt cropper was used to cut through a bike chain. A lock should also prevent the bike being removed at the end of the Academy day by someone other than the owner when the gates are opened.

We will continue to monitor CCTV footage (but if hoodies and scarves are worn it is very difficult to identify would be thieves) and liaise with the Police but the simple and relatively inexpensive method of using a good quality bike lock is usually enough to prevent a theft. We shall also be looking to ask the Police to come in and security mark pupil bikes.

'MILK'

The replacement for 'SHOW MY HOMEWORK'

You may have noticed on the Academy web site that the 'Show My Homework' icon has been replaced by 'Milk'.

Milk will enable you to monitor your child's homework in the same way as Show My Homework, and will also allow you to monitor your child's attendance as well as their achievement and behaviour points. You don't need a smartphone to use Milk. It is available for desktops, as well as IOS and Android devices.

FOLLOW THE FIREWORKS CODE

If you intend to buy or set off fireworks, make sure they comply with BS 7114 and are clearly marked for their intended use "Indoor, Garden or Display" Young people should watch and enjoy fireworks at a safe distance and follow the safety rules for using sparklers. Only adults should deal with firework displays and the lighting of fireworks. They should also take care of the safe disposal of fireworks once they have been used.

- 1. Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable.
- 2. Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- Read and follow the instructions on each firework using a torch if necessary.
- 4. Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- 5. Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.
- 6. Never return to a firework once it has been lit.
- 7. Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them.
- 8. Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- 9. Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire.

Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.

PENYEM, GAMBIA – message from Andy Butler, founder of NTF

Classroom sponsorship – another update!



Back in May 2016, Northampton Trustee Fund started searching for sponsors for the classrooms at Penyem Daycare and Nursery School. Without sponsorship, the school faced closure in 2017, when NTF funding ran out.

The Trust is delighted to announce that it has achieved its target of finding sponsorship for all 7 classrooms. The final piece of the jigsaw was completed recently with the offer of sponsorship from its friends at Corby Phoenix Rotary Club. So the school

will have: The Macfarlane Classroom, The Pyke Classroom, The Jill and Bryan Allbut Classroom, The Tricia Crighton Classroom. The Wilson Browne Solicitors Classroom, The Swift/Leese/Holt/Clasby Classroom and The Corby Phoenix Rotary Club Classroom.

The total pledged by these 7 sponsors is £3500 per annum (the total cost of running the school is £7000). NTF will fund the other £3500. However, this is still a drain on its financial resources. Ideally, the Trust would like the school to be fully funded by donations so that NTF's resources can be directed to developing other projects, particularly the Health Education Programme, which has been suspended due to the funding issues at the school.

An 8th classroom is being developed. This is The Chelsea Macfarlane and Eleanor Springham

Classroom (both former Kingswood students). This classroom needs furniture, blackboard and a TEACHER! Once finished it is hoped to be able to split the Toddler Class into two halves, the current class of 83 is too large!

There are also other rooms that can be sponsored such as the School Kitchen, Staff room, Sponsor Relations Office, toilets etc. So NTF will continue to search for sponsors who will reduce its outlay of £3500. Please get in touch if you can help.
