

Dear Parent/Carer

There is only a short while to go before our Year 11 and 6th Form pupils start their final exams. As I hope you are aware there is a lot of information on the Academy website about the exams including: revision tips, strategies and resources; exam timetable; study leave dates; exam results days etc. It is a stressful time for our pupils but the messages that we keep reinforcing with them are around thorough manageable revision and preparation leading to good results. I would also like to clear up some of the misinformation and rumour that is circulating regarding the Dance Studio here at Kingswood. It is a lovely resource, but it was never intended to be located in the Atrium. The original design of the school had the current Atrium and dining facility a third bigger than it currently is; a design error meant a last minute move of the studio into the Atrium. This means that we cannot cater for the number of pupils we currently have without split lunch arrangements, and even then pupils regularly complain about not having anywhere to sit; we can't open nearby class rooms because it is a split lunch so classes are still running etc.


As a result of this, and looking at the provision of a Year 7 'base', a feasibility study was started before I joined the Academy in January. This feasibility study is continuing, in that it is looking at relocating the dance facilities so that we can continue to offer dance as an integral part of our curriculum. If we can do this then the dining facility can be remodelled to its original specification. There is also pressure on school places with the Local Authority asking us to take a few more children. As you know Corby is an expanding town so there is a need for more school spaces for our local children. Whilst I want to be able to help I can only really do this if I can satisfactorily cater for increased pupil numbers at break and lunch times.

Like many of you, I attended the evening of dance and drama at the end of last term and the recent performance of 'Annie': they were superb. Expressive and Performing Arts will continue to be a part of the pupil offer at Kingswood Academy in facilities that enable our pupils to develop and achieve the very highest of standards.

I hope you enjoy this latest newsletter and the continued successes and achievements of our pupils.

HINTS AND TIPS TO HELP KEEP CHILDREN SAFE ON THE INTERNET AND SOCIAL NETWORKS

Hint No 3—Know who your child is talking to online

Children don't think of people they've met online through social networking and online games as strangers, they are just online friends.

It is very important to keep track of who your child is talking to. Ask them guestions like:

- How can they know so many people?
- How do they choose who to become friends with online?

Explain to your child that it's easy for people to lie about themselves online, like their age, for example, because you have never met them.

Agree your child will friend a trusted adult on their social networks or online games.

You could also become 'friends' with your child so you can see their profile and posts but your child may not want to 'friend' you, especially as they get older. Agree that your child can 'friend' a trusted adult like an aunt or uncle so they can let you know if they see anything worrying on your child's profile.

HOSPITAL PLACEMENT — WARSAW

During the February half term, I had the opportunity to go on a placement with GAP Medics thanks to the sixth form. This placement was situated in the MSW hospital in Warsaw, Poland, where I spent a week shadowing a doctor in the neurosurgery department. The main purpose was to gain some vital clinical work experience as I plan to apply to study medicine.

I (and others on the placement) had expected there to be very little action and most of the time to be spent on wards doing errands and fetching coffee. However within the first hour of meeting my mentor, I was scrubbed up and in the surgery room observing brain surgery!

This case involved an aneurysm which was being treated during an open craniotomy, which is essentially opening up the brain. At this point I had ironically remembered watching surgery videos with a friend on the placement the night before, and them telling me I definitely wouldn't see a craniotomy - how wrong they turned out to be!

While I had seen videos before, entering the surgery room and realising that it was an actual person on the table brought about different feelings. Once the surgery began however, I surprised myself with my calmness about the situation and managed to stand through the entire thing without any squeamishness.

What Holby City never tells you though, is how boring surgery can be at points. I saw one or two operations a day when I was there and while it is fascinating at many points, the surgeries could last up to six hours and keeping your attention focused for that long becomes exhausting. Not to mention I never realised that one of the most difficult aspects was standing still for that long! Shockingly the surgeons were all so relaxed while at work too, only in a few serious occasions (such as near death whilst operating) did I see the jokes and chatter briefly stop however they quickly resumed afterwards.

What really hit me hard was how people were affected after the operations, very few would make a full recovery and many had brain damage that would completely alter their lives. I was particularly affected by the death of someone on the ward and how the doctors reacted to it. While I understood that it is the way it is and a department like that probably has a high mortality rate, it personally hit me heavily and made me view the realities of medicine and some of the less optimistic outcomes.

Overall the experience was valuable and changed my perspective of medicine greatly, although I still plan to study medicine and have become more determined than before to do it. It has helped me get an idea of where I may like to specialise within the field and see a lot of the realities of working in medicine too, like the fact even a neurosurgeon can work up to a 36 hour shift or how often law suits come into play. The experience gained will be invaluable in my applications and I've had the ability to see things I didn't think I'd get the opportunity to for years.
