Dear Parents/Carers

Welcome back to Term 2. I hope that you all managed some rest and recuperation during the break.

As I'm sure you are aware, I wrote in the last newsletter about some bike thefts that had taken place at the Academy towards the end of Term 1. I explained how important it is for pupils to use a good quality bike lock to help prevent any theft (2 of the bikes stolen were not locked up in the bike shelters) and that we were liaising with the Police regarding their ongoing investigation.

I am pleased to say that the Police agreed to come into the Academy to conduct security marking on all and any bikes that pupils brought on two specific days. Therefore, on Tuesday 1 and Wednesday 2 November, four neighbourhood wardens and four PCSOs came into the Academy during lunchtime to fit security tags to bikes free-of-charge. It only took a few minutes for two people to do each bike.

I hoped that all pupils who ride their bikes to school would take advantage of this fantastic service being offered by the Police, and many did. We hope to repeat the process later in the year, enabling pupils who missed the opportunity to have their bikes security marked. Hopefully this will help prevent any further episodes of theft from the Academy.

ACADEMY UPDATE

Many of you will be aware that we decided to relocate our dance studio into the theatre, freeing up the space in the Atrium to extend our dining facilities. Although initially unpopular, this has proven to be a success and all concerned have commented that the outcome was far better than they expected. The pupils now benefit from a far larger dining space, which allows them more room to move, extra seating and a chance to sit and socialise together as they all eat at the same time as opposed to having two sittings. When you add this to the fact that we installed eight air conditioning units into the same area last year, we believe we have now provided the pupils with an airy, spacious and comfortable dining space.

Unfortunately, even though we have security fencing, some cycles have been stolen over the past few weeks. Can I remind you that if your child is to bring a cycle into school, they must provide a secure lock, which should be of a quality that prevents opportune thieving. Unfortunately, the school insurance policy does not cover the loss of cycles, so we always advise parents to take out a small insurance policy on the more valuable cycles, as we know how expensive they are.

The weather is set to change. Please be advised that although all of our plant system works well, when it is freezing outside the school becomes cooler inside and takes a little longer to warm up. Please remind your child that jumpers should be worn and that appropriate coats should be available.

As the weather becomes colder and we have overnight frosts and maybe ice, we can expect the paths and roadways to become slippery. Although this is addressed with road salt, there will inevitably be areas that we use that have not been salted and therefore could remain slippery.

Kingswood Secondary Academy Physical Education Department **Protective Equipment Statement**

All contact sports carry the risk of injury; therefore, although not compulsory, Kingswood Secondary Academy strongly recommends the use of personal protective equipment during participation in contact sports, namely football, rugby and hockey. This includes the use of shin pads and oral protective equipment (mouth guards/gum shields). This equipment is widely available from sports shops.

The British Dental Association states that anyone engaged in contact sports should wear a well-made mouth guard to reduce the risk of injury to teeth. They go on to say that a custom made mouth guard designed by a dentist will provide a better fit, and, in the cases of students who have a brace, may be essential. Parents and guardians should seek advice on mouth guards from their dentist, as some types may not be suitable in some circumstances. Frequent questions can arise regarding the need for the wearing of protective equipment by pupils in schools engaged in rugby, football and hockey. Hopefully the following summary guidance will prove helpful:

- Mouth guards and shin pads can provide useful protection against injuries in full competitive games of hockey, football and rugby. Their provision is the responsibility of the individual pupil and his/her parent/s. They should be included as part of the student's physical education kit;
- When worn, they need to be properly fitted and cared for;
- Mouth guards/gum shields are personal and must never be shared or borrowed.

If you have any difficulties providing kit for your child or if you have any queries or concerns, please contact the school Physical Education department.
