Respect, Independence, Service, Empathy

Why is Enrichment so important?

Enrichment:

- Helps children develop their interests and talents;
- Enables children to develop their character, confidence and independence;
- Teaches children how to keep physically and mentally healthy;
- Prepares individuals for future success.

Students can also participate in the following:

Student council: Elected form representatives from all year groups discuss issues affecting students and the Academy. This is a working party which helps our Academy progress.

KEM – Kingswood Ethnic Minorities: Volunteers discuss issues that affect and create a more inclusive community. This raises awareness, and students help to plan our cultural celebration days.

LGBTQ+: Formed of students from all year groups. This is an open and safe group where students discuss issues affecting their community. They also raise awareness by organising events and celebration days.

PSHE Curriculum Overview

As we move into the final term, all year groups will focus on the theme of **Healthy Wellbeing**. In addition, most year groups will continue to study the statutory requirements of **Relationships and Sex Education (RSE)**.

Year 7 will learn about puberty and body development. Pupils will be introduced to secondary-level RSE topics, including reproductive systems and personal hygiene (such as diet and body odour), alongside lessons focused on self-esteem.

Year 8 will build on aspects of the Year 7 curriculum, revisiting themes such as healthy eating, body-positive image, and stress management. Pupils will also explore issues surrounding bullying, including safeguarding and child abuse.

Year 9 will spend time studying reproductive systems before moving on to topics related to body confidence. Later in the term, pupils will learn about bullying, stalking, the impact of social media, and cancer prevention.

Year 10 will begin the term with a final RSE lesson on delaying sexual activity, before progressing to a focus on mental health and wellbeing. Topics include managing anger and anxiety, understanding mental health illnesses, self-care strategies, and how to support friends during difficult times.

For all PSHE topics, pupils have access to the **Kingswood Way QR code**, which allows them to confidentially share concerns with **Mrs Bonner**. Pupils are also signposted to local RSE and mental health support services available across the **North Northamptonshire** area during PSHE lessons.

Chair of the Kingswood, Hazel Leys and Exeter Neighbourhood Board Announced for £20 Million Pride in Place Programme

We are delighted to share the fantastic news that Mrs Alex Bonner, Senior Assistant Principal at Kingswood Secondary Academy, has been appointed Chair of the Kingswood, Hazel Leys and Exeter Neighbourhood Board as part of the Government's £20 million Pride in Place programme for Corby.

A lifelong Corby resident, Alex was born and raised in the town and has lived on the Exeter estate for the past 24 years. She has worked with young people for over 30 years, with 17 of those spent at Kingswood Secondary Academy, where she teaches English and is a valued member of the senior leadership team.

The Neighbourhood Board will oversee how £20 million of government investment is used over the next 10 years to support regeneration and long-term improvement across the Kingswood, Hazel Leys and Exeter estates. While the remaining members of the Board are yet to be appointed, the Chair will play a pivotal role in shaping the Board's composition and direction.

Speaking about her appointment, Alex said:

"I'm immensely proud to have been chosen as chair of the board which will oversee such a big investment into the heart of these neighbourhoods, and I look forward to working closely with everyone involved and seeing real progress."

Corby has some incredibly resilient people who are bursting with creativity and passion. Plans for Kingswood, Hazel Leys and Exeter must be shaped collaboratively, with local voices leading the way, and I'm delighted to be able to play a part in this.

I believe that Kingswood Secondary Academy, and the young people within the local area, will be pivotal as the driving force of this brilliant project."

The Pride in Place programme aims to develop a shared, long-term vision for each neighbourhood, identifying local priorities and determining how investment will be spent to best support the community. As Chair, Alex will work closely with local MPs, councillors, community representatives, businesses and residents to ensure transparent governance, strong community engagement and a legacy once the programme concludes.

Lee Barron MP, Member of Parliament for Corby and East Northamptonshire, commented:

"It was essential that we appointed someone with strong links to this Corby neighbourhood to lead the project, and that's why Alex is such a great fit as Chair of the Board. I'm looking forward to seeing real progress as the project moves forward."

Cllr Martin Griffiths, Leader of North Northamptonshire Council, also congratulated Alex on her appointment, highlighting her personal connection to the area and commitment to championing the community's ambitions.

We are incredibly proud of Mrs Bonner's achievement and know she will use this opportunity to make a meaningful and lasting difference for our local community.

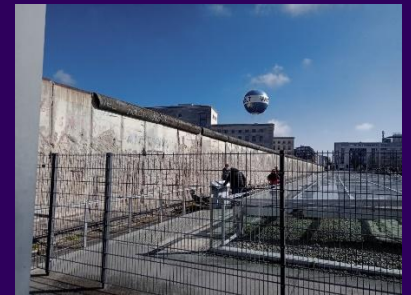

Year 11 History Trip to Berlin

From 30 March to 2 April, our Year 11 students took part in a four-day History trip to Berlin, gaining valuable first-hand experiences that enriched their understanding of GCSE History.

The group visited a range of significant sites linked to Germany between 1918 and 1939, including Sachsenhausen, the Reichstag, the Brandenburg Gate, the Berlin Wall, and the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe. These visits provided valuable opportunities for students to deepen their knowledge by connecting classroom learning with real historical locations.



Alongside the educational visits, students also enjoyed exploring German culture, tasting traditional food, and taking part in an evening of bowling. The students are to be commended for demonstrating excellent maturity and conduct throughout the trip.

Building on Success

What is UKMT?

The UK Mathematics Trust (UKMT) is a national charity that provides opportunities for students aged 11–18 to develop their mathematical thinking through engaging and challenging competitions.

- Logical thinking
- Problem-solving
- Mathematical reasoning

Why It Matters

Taking part in the UKMT Challenge helps students to:

Build confidence in their mathematical ability

Develop problem-solving skills

Discover enjoyment in maths beyond the classroom

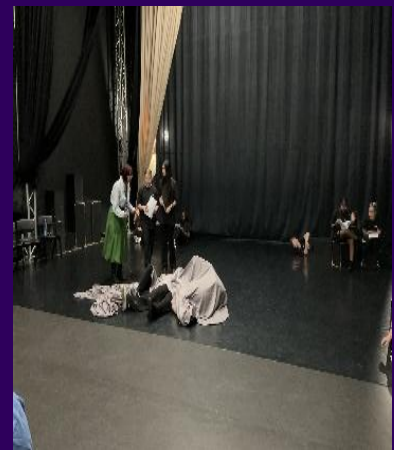

Careers Education and Guidance at Kingswood Secondary Academy

As the Careers Adviser at Kingswood Secondary Academy, I provide structured and personalised guidance to support students in planning their future pathways.

All students in Years 10 and 11 receive an individual 1:1 careers meeting, during which we discuss their aspirations, post-16 options, and next steps. Following each meeting, students are provided with a typed action plan, which is shared via their school email and Unifrog account to ensure accessibility and ongoing reference.

Students who remain in the Sixth Form are offered an additional 1:1 guidance meeting during the summer term of Year 12. These sessions focus on exploring and preparing for post-18 pathways, including university applications, apprenticeships, and other training opportunities.

This structured programme ensures that all students receive individualised, impartial advice at key transition points, supporting them to make informed decisions about their future.

As the Careers Adviser at Kingswood Secondary Academy, the best part of my role is speaking to students about their future plans. I first met Denis in Year 10 and have stayed in touch with him throughout his time in the Sixth Form, where he is on track to achieve an A in Maths alongside Distinction* grades in IT and Business.

Seldom have I encountered a more focused and dedicated individual, with Denis showing clear determination from an early stage to secure a degree apprenticeship with a large UK company. Through hard work, resilience and perseverance, Denis was recently offered an IT apprenticeship with Microsoft.



Denis has successfully secured a degree apprenticeship with Microsoft, a fantastic achievement following a competitive application process.



A degree apprenticeship enables students to work towards an undergraduate degree while earning a salary and gaining invaluable industry experience. Despite receiving several final-stage offers, a role with Microsoft within their B2B Sales and AI-enabled Customer Solutions team was always Denis's preferred option.

Denis will begin his new role in September, commuting to the Microsoft office in Paddington, London, alongside working from home. I am confident that he will thoroughly enjoy his apprenticeship and will prove to be a real asset to the company. He plans to remain in contact with the school, and everyone at Kingswood looks forward to hearing about his progress.





In his own words, to follow are Denis's Top 10 tips on how he achieved his success:

Start your planning early

Year 13 is too late as you need to build your CV, know where to apply for vacancies, practice online assessments and structure interview answers. The students already ahead of you have been working on this since year 12.

Use every platform

Don't just wait for roles to come to you - treat finding opportunities like a job. I set up accounts on various apprenticeship websites including Trackr, the government website, Apprentago and Higherin. Most importantly - visit company websites directly.

Network everywhere – Reach Out

At my school careers fair, I handed out business cards (with a QR code linking to my LinkedIn) to every company in the room. One of those conversations led to LinkedIn messages, then a coffee chat with Nicky Griffin, a senior IT consultant at Microsoft. Coffee chats give you things no website can: the language people use internally, honest insight into the role, and a name you can mention naturally in your interview. Nicky was an amazing mentor.

Manage your applications

At my peak I was juggling 5–6 online assessments and video interviews in a single week. On average, 2 per week from November through to March. I used an Excel spreadsheet to manage my applications. A good spreadsheet is also available on Trackr.

Research the company

Visit company websites, use AI, listen to podcasts, watch videos, read the LinkedIn posts of existing employees. Find out about current projects e.g. for Microsoft I researched their current "garage" initiative. I also attended the Microsoft prep session on Zoom and had a question ready as I was determined to be remembered.

Work experience is important

There are far more opportunities than most students know about - virtual programmes, in-person placements, summer experiences. In year 12 I did 5 days at Cisco through their Pathways programme. This changed everything as I saw my competition for the first time.

Join online communities

This shifted my entire perspective as I could measure myself against the most competitive students in the UK. Seeing the effort other students were putting in made me raise my own standards. You cannot see what elite looks like from just inside your own school. Sites I recommend include LEAF and ApprentaDream.

Make the most of social media

Use LinkedIn as a research tool. Find people who have landed similar roles, look at how they position themselves, take note of their certificates. Follow companies. Post positive comments. Be active on Tik-Tok and other sites looking for genuine advice and tips from people who have just landed offers.

All it takes is one

For a long time nothing. Silence feels like failure. Rejections, no responses, watching others get offers. Then I got my Microsoft offer. From March onwards 5 final stage offers including Deutsche Bank, Oliver Wyman, and Santander. A Zoom interview at Citi Group. It isn't a steady stream - it's silence, then everything at once. If you put in the hard work the drought isn't a sign you've failed. It's just the gap before the dam breaks.

Be bold in your interviews

Here's what most people miss: at this level, every candidate is underqualified. Nobody has 3 years of experience at 18. So, in the final stages, they are not just assessing your answers – they are hiring people they want to work with that will blend in with their team.

Annual Lockdown Drill:

The safety and welfare of our students and staff is our highest priority at Kingswood. As you would expect, we regularly practise emergency drills to ensure our staff and students know what to do in an emergency. The aims of the training drills are to improve our ability to protect pupils/students, save lives, and reduce injuries. These practice drills allow us to evaluate our emergency operation plans and improve our response skills.

For many years now we have also practised our 'Lockdown Drill' and we wanted to make you aware of this. These drills are designed to ensure that pupils/students are aware of our safety procedures and to reduce the level of anxiety that could come from a real-life situation should it ever occur - which of course, we hope never will.

A lockdown would be initiated when a situation arises that requires the isolation (rather than evacuation) of students and staff from an identified risk, such as; dangerous animal in the vicinity of the school, local emergency (gas cloud/air pollution), or an intruder on our site.

In the event of a real risk and lockdown, we would initiate lockdown in liaison with the police. Parents and carers will be contacted at a suitable time to inform them of the event. It is vital that parent(s)/carer(s) do not:

- Contact the school via telephone in order to keep our phone lines clear
- Contact your child/children directly by mobile phone even if they contact you
- Come to school in person, unless told it is safe to do so by ourselves

We appreciate that this would be extremely difficult, but if the above points are not followed this could jeopardise the safety of students and staff in school.

Please be sure that your contact information is up to date and accurate. It is a good idea to have several trusted adults listed as contacts with the school.

We must stress that these incidents are extremely unlikely to occur. However, we are best to be prepared and because of our lockdown planning we did successfully initiate a lockdown on the advice of the Police in 2022 when stray dogs were in the local community.

Parking and Access to Kingswood Secondary Academy

Wherever possible, we encourage our students to walk or cycle to the Academy, as this offers clear health and environmental benefits.

If you do bring your child by car, please note the following:

Dropping Off Your Child in the Morning

It would be most helpful if you could drop off your child a few hundred metres from the school and allow them to walk the short distance in.

If you wish to use our roundabout, this is permitted in the mornings. This works well because drop-offs occur over a 30–45-minute period, so congestion is generally not a significant issue.

Collecting Your Child at the End of the Day

Due to the large number of students leaving in a short time frame, we do not allow parents onto the site to collect their children. This is because of the significant congestion it causes, which leads to vehicles backing up onto Gainsborough Road and blocking traffic in both directions.

In summary:

Please do not drive onto the school site to collect your child at the end of the day.

Exception:

If your child has a disability, please speak with their Head of Year or Miss Skorwider in our Special Educational Needs Department, who will make appropriate arrangements.

Consideration for Local Residents

We often receive complaints from local residents, particularly on Tower Hill Road and Oak Wood Drive. With this in mind, we kindly ask that you:

- Note that **Tower Hill Road is a no-stopping area** between Monday and Friday, 8am–6pm. This is clearly signposted.
- Park considerately. Consider parking further away and allowing your child to walk a few minutes to meet you, helping reduce congestion.
- Avoid blocking residents' driveways or using them to turn around or stop.
- Do not park on yellow lines.

The AA - School Safety Alert

- Over **6,000 children under 16** were injured on UK roads in 2023 while walking or cycling.

The AA - Safety Advice for Drivers

- Slow down in school zones—even if not signposted.
- Avoid distractions, especially mobile phone use.
- Park responsibly—not near school gates or on zigzag lines.
- Watch out for children on bikes, scooters, or crossing roads.
- Obey school crossing patrols.

Kingswood Secondary Academy – Uniform Requirements

At Kingswood Secondary Academy we believe that wearing our distinctive uniform gives our students a sense of belonging, fosters pride in the Academy and stops students coming to school in inappropriate clothing or footwear. Students are our ambassadors in the community and therefore we expect all students to wear full uniform when travelling to and from the Academy, at all Academy functions, on extra-curricular visits and when taking part in sports events. Please refer to our website for updated uniform policy and expectations.

Our Academy uniform consists of:

- An Academy tie with a traditional white shirt which has a fastened top button and is long enough to be tucked into trousers or a skirt; the bottom of the tie should meet the waistband.
- Black trousers or skirt made of standard material (see below) – studs or zips on pockets must not be visible. Jeans, cords, hipster and tight-fitting (e.g. Revs-style) trousers are not appropriate, and all trousers should cover the ankle. Combat-style trousers, e.g. with additional side pockets, are not allowed.
- We introduced a **new skirt** in September 2025, and it is available for purchase from **Price and Buckland**, (our uniform supplier). Any student who chooses to wear a skirt must wear this approved style purchased from Price and Buckland. Students who prefer not to wear a skirt may continue to wear **tailored black trousers**, which should meet the guidelines outlined in our current uniform policy.
- Academy blazer for all students in years 7 to 11.
- Black or grey socks with black trousers; neutral or black tights with skirts.
- Black leather or leather-style traditional school shoes that can be polished, with a heel no more than 2cm in height. (No boots or trainers, or trainer-style shoes such as Vans or Converse are allowed. Girls' ballet-type footwear is not acceptable)

Physical Education kit for all years:

- Black tracksuit bottoms with Academy logo
- Black short-sleeved sports polo shirt with purple panels and the Academy logo
- Black long-sleeved sports shirt with purple panels and the Academy logo
- Black shorts with Academy logo
- Suitable trainers or other sports footwear
- Sports leggings with academy logo or plain black sports leggings (not cotton) Students will also be required to bring other appropriate kit to their PE lessons where necessary. For example, shin-guards for contact sports, studded boots for rugby, mouth guard for some PE activities. Students will be given specific advice from their PE teachers.
